

Prominent Citizen, B.F. Penix, 82, Dies

Benjamin Franklin Penix, 82, Morehead community leader, and known in railroad circles throughout northeastern Kentucky, died Thursday night at St. Claire Medical Center.

The end was not unexpected as Mr. Penix, retired agent of the C&O railroad, had been in failing health for more than three years.

For people are known for ther honesty, integrity and love of fellow man more than was Ben Penix. Ills most oft expressed business thought was, "A man's word should be as good as his bond." And, Mr Penix practiced that expression throughout his adult life.

For the past 41 years he had lived at Morehead where he was agent in charge at the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad, retiring in 1961.

He began his railroad career in 1908 of Falmouth, Ky, with the L&N. He was telegraph operator and ticket agent on the C&O at Peach Orchard and Farmers before advancing in the 1920's to station agent at Shelbiana, then one of the busiest terminals on the Big Sandy division.

Born in Menifee County

In 1931 Mr. Penix's request to be transferred from Shelbiana to the agent's position in Morehead was granted. At the time he said he expected to reside the rest of his life at Morehead, the place he loved the most, and educate his children here. Mr. Penix was born Feb. 5, 1889 at

Mr. Penix was born Feb. 5, 1889 a' McCreasey in Menifee County, son of the late W.W. and Nancy (Quicksoll) Penix. When he was a boy the family moved to Olympia in Bath County where Mr. Penix received his elementary schooling. Olympia is on the C&O railroad, and the boy saw the trains go by and decided to be a railroader, then about the most prestigious business in this area.

During his life Mr. Penix received many awards and citations from the C&O. He personally knew almost every conductor, engineer, brakeman, sgent, telegrapher etc on the Lexington and Big Sandy divisions. A lifelong and active member of the

Christian Church, Mr. Penix taught Sunday School for many years.

He was devoted to the Masonic fraternial order, and has a 50 year Masonic pin. He held many offices in the Masons, including Master at Morehead, and Deputy filments Master of Kontuck. Garage States



John had five brothers and five sisters. The brothers were James W., Ben F., Charles Leon , Thomas Quicksall, and Stanley C. The sisters were Oueen Elizabeth, Ruth E., Ida, Bertha and Mary.

John died at the age of 87 on April 6, 1965 in Lexington, Kentucky after a brief illness. John is next in the line of descendents.

The following history for John was written by Jesse Penix Underwood from her memories as a child.

'John Penix was the second son of W.W. Penix and Nancy Caroline Quicksall. I believe he was spoiled by his grandmother Nancy Pierce who may have bought him his "wheels" (See Family picture.) He was 34 years old when he married Lillie Smith. He told Lillie's parents that they would run away if they didn't qive consent to the marriage which had they hesitated to do since Lillie was only 14 years old at the time.

When I was about six years old My father came down with a bone disease which resulted in a running sore on his knee. He went to Charleston, West Virginia to visit his brother Ben who entered him into the hospital. They wanted to cut off the leg bed. above the knee, so, John put on accident and Alvie got his nose his clothes and came home. We all bent and he lost some teeth.

John and was near his father and mother Cynthiana, Kentucky to pay the bills. A strange came along and told John that he could cure the leg with an herbal medicine. He gave the recipe to my mother who gathered the barks and herbs and made a syrup which John was to take every day (I think I still have the recipe somewhere).

I believe he also had gout because he couldn't stand the sheets touching his feet (editor Willie had note: son qout also.). After a while the medicine worked well enough for John to limp on a stiff leg. From then on he worked at odd jobs, farmed and even worked on the С 6 A railroad as а "waterboy".

After John was well enough to work he bought the "Wright" place about two miles east of my grandfather. I believe mγ qrandfather also qave him another house with 15 acres. John put the two together and built a nice house with a double fireplace in the center and it also had a back porch.

We kids picked blackberries and sold them to buy screen wire to put around the porch to keep the flies out. This is the home where Archie and Alvie were chopping wood and Archie dared Alvie to chop with his toes on the wood (See story recalled by me as told by Archie.). Alvie did chop but Archie lost only one toe forever.

In April 1941 Alvie and Archie were riding in a truck The man driving had an moved to the "pond place" which By this time my mother and

father were separated and my father was made guardian. He talked the boys into buying the "sour Springs" home until he became too sick to live alone. He then moved in with Callie and stayed there until his death.

Prickley Ash Sasaparilla Wild Cherry Blood Root Dogwood
